# Introduction

We know that not everyone can or wishes to rent in St Andrews, perhaps due to affordability, availability, or personal preference. This can especially be the case for postgraduate taught or postgraduate research students. Students often live in areas like Guardbridge, Leuchars, Dundee, Cupar, the East Neuk of Fife, and Edinburgh, each giving a different type of student experience.

With this in mind, we have created some general guidance to support you if you are looking for accommodation outside of St Andrews.

Please note that, under the University's [Location of Studies Policy](#), a 'commutable distance from St Andrews' is defined as being within 75 miles of the town. We recommend you refer to the guidance set out in this policy when making decisions about housing. The University owns a comparatively small number of properties outside St Andrews which may be more suited to you if you do not wish to live within St Andrews. ## Advice about renting

### Avoiding Scams

Unfortunately, there have been instances of rental fraud over the last few years, with scammers pretending to own properties in order to secure a 'deposit.' This leaves students without a room/flat, and having handed over large sums of money.

Check the landlord listed with the property against the list of registered landlords in the Scottish Landlord Register. Landlords must be registered, unless they are a live-in landlord. If the landlord isn't registered, this is a red flag and means you should avoid renting that property.

Only the landlord or a registered agent can let you the property. Friends and family others cannot do this, so do not believe anyone claiming to be a relative of the landlord letting the property on their behalf.

If you are concerned about fraud, or whether the listed property exists, please contact the Union's Advocacy & Advice Service.

### Viewings

Once you have contacted the landlord or agent, and confirmed it is real, you may be able to come for a viewing.

You should check for:

- Available appliances
- Bills and other costs (such as for garden maintenance)
- The landlord/letting agency

Ensure that the property is in a good state, and meets the Repairing Standard (the landlord is legally required to ensure the property meets this standard).

## Things to look out for

When presented with the tenancy agreement, you should check it over for any anomalies. Most contracts are Private Residential Tenancies (PRTs), but you should check to make sure that there are no unusual clauses. You can refer to the [Scottish Government's guidance](#), and [model PRT](#) to check your contract over.

If you are unsure of anything in your agreement, please contact the Union's [Advocacy & Advice Service](#), as they are trained in contracts and tenants' rights.

## Other things to consider

### Council Tax

Make sure to register your student Council Tax exemption. The University will not pass on your details automatically if you are living outside of Fife, so you will have to register your exemption. Contact your local Council, or check their website for how to do this.

### Transport

The University offers [subsidised Stagecoach bus tickets](#) for flexible or multi-day tickets across East Scotland, covering St Andrews, Dundee, Fife, and Angus.

The 99 Stagecoach bus service offers regular travel to Guardbridge, Leuchars, and Dundee. These buses run daily and come by every few minutes (though less frequently in the evenings and on Sundays). They also operate a late service during semester time, Monday-Thursday. These are marked on the timetable as USTA, and are free to staff and students when you show your University student or staff card. These usually depart from the St Andrews bus station at 00:30am (with a 02:00am departure on Wednesdays also). There are train stations in Leuchars, Dundee, Cupar, and across the Fife coast, to help you get around Scotland and the wider UK.

## Things to do outside St Andrews

If you're looking to live in Dundee, you'll find a small but busy city, with plenty of pubs, bars, restaurants, and shops. If you're looking for a bit of culture, Dundee has museums, theatres, and live music. There are more options for international food shops and restaurants too, if you like trying different cuisines, or want to be reminded of food from your home country.

Edinburgh, as Scotland's capital, is much bigger than Dundee, with a blend of historic architecture and modern city life. Like Dundee, there are many museums, and arts and culture venues to explore. Edinburgh also has many international food shops and restaurants to try.

In the East Neuk, you'll find more relaxed vibes with small coastal towns and villages, with tidal pools and easy access to the sea.

In wider Fife, like Kirkcaldy and Cupar, you'll find towns with museums, great cafes, and places to walk.

## Study spaces

Plan ahead with your School to see if they're able to put aside a desk space for you in town, given that you are commuting. Each School will have a different policy and space availability, so please check with your School directly.

You may also wish to use other commuter spaces when you're in town so you have a place to study before going home.

The Old Burgh School, which houses St Leonard's College, has desks reserved for PhD and commuter students, as well as desks for any PG. You can also book rooms for study, group work, and workshops, though the Resource Booker (search OBS to see what's available).

## Community

As a postgraduate student, and a commuter student, you may be looking for ways to find your community in St Andrews.

St Leonard's College is a space for the PG community in St Andrews, hosting and supporting events for all PG students. You can keep up to date with what they're offering by following their Instagram and Facebook pages, and checking your emails for the monthly newsletter, which you can also access on the website.

Carers, Commuters, Mature, and Flexible Learners (CCMFL) Network, is a Union Network which advocates and builds community for students across the CCMFL experience, including students who commute.
